

The first decade of the new millennium has seen the introduction of new treatment options for anal fissures. Innovations are required to spawn advances in surgery also in the future. Yet is every innovation really effective? Given the current situation in which the medical sector, too, is increasingly subject to cost pressure, new innovations are examined more closely, as anything new usually means additional costs. Plus there is the fact that the industry's scope for innovation is continually narrowing. In the past, technical innovations in instruments brought us the leap from open to laparoscopic surgery, whereas today improvements tend to be only gradual.
